After my husband's death I moved back to North Wales to be near my sister who inherited the 210 Church St. house. I was so thrilled to be able to buy the beautiful home of Dr. Anders (a relative).

My father, who eventually worked for Sauers Real Estate Company, became the family historian and I got my love of history and heritage from him. I love the history and charm of our beautiful town. Many of my ancestors and family have attended North Wales Baptist church from the early 1900's and I consider this town, and my church family, my home.

I would love to be on the commission to help preserve, teach and restore our beautiful town history and heritage. Thanks for this opportunity.

Public Comment

There was no public comment at this time.

Consideration: Recognize National Library Week

President Sando read a proclamation on behalf of Council, proclaiming National Library Week, April 7-13, 2019 in North Wales Borough. He then encouraged everyone to visit North Wales Area Library to enjoy all its amenities. Jayne Blackledge, Library Director, announced a number of new exciting opportunities the Library has to offer. She also announced the Taste of Montgomery County event on March 28 at Montgomery County Community College. Part of the event proceeds will be provided to the Library. Jayne then thanked Council for all their support.

Consideration: Designate April 2019 as Pennsylvania 811 Safe Digging Month

President Sando read another proclamation on behalf of Council, proclaiming April 2019 as "Pennsylvania 811 Safe Digging Month" in North Wales Borough. Assistant Manager Guzzardo strongly encouraged everyone to always call 811 before you dig. It's a free service that identifies underground utility lines so people don't accidentally hit them during excavation.

Consideration: Montco 2040 Implementation Grant Application

Assistant Manager Guzzardo provided an overview of the grant project. Council members expressed concerns with stormwater management, signage and the impacts of the project on the affected property owners in the project area. Assistant Manager Guzzardo stated all of these aspects would be taken into consideration during the engineering and design phase of the project. Member Little made a motion to approve an application for the Montco 2040 Grant Program. Member McClure seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Authorize Payment of \$232,168.82 for SRTS Program

Assistant Manager Guzzardo provided an update on the construction activities that have taken place to date. Member Amato asked what the review process is for payments. Assistant Manager Guzzardo explained McMahon and PennDOT review all construction activities before payments are issued.

Member Little made a motion to authorize payment in the amount of \$232,168.82 for the Safe Routes to School Program. Member McClure seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Disbursements: \$311,537.28

Assistant Manager Guzzardo asked Council if they had any questions about the bills. Council asked for clarification on several bills which Assistant Manager Guzzardo provided.

Member Neiderhiser made a motion to approve payment of the bills in the amount of \$311,537.28. Member Scott seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Assistant Manager Guzzardo stated he hadn't received any committee or board reports or zoning applications. He also indicated that there was no old business to discuss.

Solicitor / Mayor / Council / Manager

Solicitor Filice announced there will be an executive session following the meeting to discuss two personnel matters and no action would be taken following the executive session.

Andrew Berenson, 439 Washington Avenue, asked Solicitor Filice if he could provide an update on either the Sunlight of the Spirt House case or the Station Place appeal. Solicitor Filice stated the Sunlight of the Spirt House case is currently in the discovery phase. He then stated that the Court of Common Pleas has upheld the decision of the North Wales Borough Council, with regard to the Station Place appeal. He then stated Station Place, LLC appealed the Court of Common Pleas decision to the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania.

Mayor D'Angelo expressed he enjoyed the Borough's 150th Anniversary Ball, held at the William Penn Inn on February 16, 2019.

Vice President Cherry thanked everyone who attended the 150th Anniversary Ball. He also thanked President Sando for giving a speech at the event.

President Sando thanked everyone on the 150th Executive Committee for all their hard work and encouraged people to attend all of the other anniversary events.

Assistant Manager Guzzardo review the construction schedule for the Safe Routes to School Project. He stated the schedule is available at Borough Hall and on the Borough's website. He then announced the following events: Montgomery County Borough's association dinner meeting on February 28, the North Wales Water Authority's Bucks County Division Office open house on February 28 and the Vendor Bingo event on March 17.

Chief Eves announced he had looked into a "no-knock" ordinance so that way solicitors are prohibited from knocking on certain people's doors if they register with the Borough. He then stated he was looking into possible solutions with PennDOT to improve the Main and Walnut Street intersection.




