Working Guidance

Title: Council Member Communications

As North Wales residents, all council members are free to contact the borough offices and the police department about issues that impact them personally. Council members are also encouraged to attend or join public commissions and boards or volunteer on borough event committees unless expressly prohibited by borough code. However, due to their elected position and perceived authority, council members should be constantly aware of how their interactions, requests, or suggestions may be interpreted. All council communications should be professional and unambiguous in content.

This Guidance suggests reasonable communication boundaries for members of council.

Police: All officers report to the police chief and the police chief reports to the mayor.ⁱ

1. All police related complaints, whether from a council member or from a resident, are to be directed to the police department via the “Police Complaint” form. The mayor and police chief should keep the council president and the borough manager informed of any borough-wide concerns raised by a council member.
2. If an officer raises a police-related administrative question or issue to a council member, the officer should be directed to the chief of police for an official response.
3. A council member who wishes to view a police practice or procedure should submit that request in writing to the mayor. A demonstration or awareness of the practice or procedure may be valuable to all members of council and thus should be arranged for the group by the mayor.

Borough Administration: All borough activities and employees are managed directly by the borough managerⁱⁱ. The borough manager reports directly to borough council via the council president.ⁱⁱⁱ

1. Under no circumstances should a council member request or direct an activity of a borough employee.
2. Council members should be cognizant of the time pressures on the borough manager and assistant manager. It is expected that ALL council members - PRIOR to contacting the borough - will make a good-faith attempt to find an answer themselves via the internet, PSAB, or searching the on-line ordinances and processes.
3. If you feel you must contact the borough manager or the assistant manager then please be aware that due to time constraints, borough priorities and potential confidentiality issues, they may respond to your question(s) in one of the following ways at their prerogative:
 - a. They may respond directly to the question if the answer is quick and easy,
 - b. They may distribute your question and the response to all of council if they feel the information would be useful to the full council,
 - c. They may decide to answer your question as part of the manager’s report at a council meeting.

4. The borough manager will assess all requests for tours or in-depth information for their value to the full council. It might be best for the borough manager to provide the tour and/or information to all of council. This decision is the prerogative of the borough manager and council president.

Solicitor ^{iii, iv}

1. All communications to the Solicitor are through the borough manager, the mayor, or the council president acting as the representative of council and its subcommittees.

Borough Engineer, Contracted Vendors and Consultants

1. All communications with the engineer, vendors and consultants are through the borough manager only or the solicitor as appropriate if directed by the borough manager or Council President.

Zoning Hearing Board, Pension Committee, Emergency Management Coordinator

1. Although these entities are created by borough code, they operate with complete autonomy and are thus under no authority from borough council or the borough manager. Interactions with these entities are via official council approved communications.

Resident Communications

1. Complaints: (i.e. Resident concerns that can be addressed via a complaint form)

(Note: Permits and Borough/Police Complaint Forms are found on their respective web sites.)

- ⌘ Any resident who wishes to voice a complaint or an issue should be directed to complete either the “North Wales Borough Complaint Form” or the “North Wales Police Department Complaint Form”, whichever is applicable to the complaint.

Deleted: “As their elected official you can certainly have a discussion to better understand their issue. You may even assist them with the preparation of the applicable complaint form or with framing their issue if they wish to bring the issue forward to council.”

Replaced with: “As their elected official you can certainly have a discussion to better understand their issue and, if appropriate, suggest they bring the issue forward to council for further discussion.”

Many neighbor-to-neighbor complaints are ordinance related. Some complaints may also be civil related and thus the borough should not be legally involved. The resident should again be directed to the borough’s complaint form.

- b. It is the sole responsibility of the borough manager to address any resident's complaint^v and it is the sole responsibility of the chief of police to address complaints about the police department or individual officers.

2. Public Activities:

- a. Every council member should familiarize themselves with the permit and complaint forms on the borough website. Many requests by residents can be addressed simply by submitting the appropriate permit to the borough for review. For instance, if a resident requests a public activity of any sort, the council member could assist with the development and submission of a “Public Activity” permit form. HOWEVER, keep in mind that the borough and its’ elected officials cannot typically be seen to officially support the activity itself, but can certainly personally support an activity. Be careful NOT to imply official borough support.

3. Miscellaneous Resident Concerns: (i.e. Complaints not appropriate for complaint form)

These are issues that are typically related to ongoing/approved projects or very generic borough related issues. Some examples may be:

- i. Parking in the borough,
- ii. Unhappy with certain aspects of an approved project,

Deleted: “Council members should listen to the resident and if appropriate help them to formulate their position (without taking a side if possible). The resident should be encouraged to bring the issue to council for discussion.”

Replaced with: “Council members should listen to the resident and, if appropriate, encourage them to bring the issue to council for discussion.”

4. Solicitation of views: (e.g. gathering information or a position/view on upcoming council issues)

- a. Asking a resident their view on a specific topic of borough interest is always a good way to build rapport. It also assists in the gathering of positions and views that may not be expressed during a council meeting. Caution: Be careful of making promises or stating a position that you may have to change later when additional facts are presented. Also, remember that it is the collective voice of council that makes decisions not the individual voice of a council member.

Boards/Commissions/External Entities:

1. No Council member has the authority to speak on behalf of the borough or the borough council when attending a board or commission meeting or when interacting with an external entity unless they are requested to do so by council.
2. It is the responsibility of the borough manager to interface with our groups of volunteers who help organize and execute our borough events. Borough council members should not be giving official directions to these groups, but can be personally supportive.

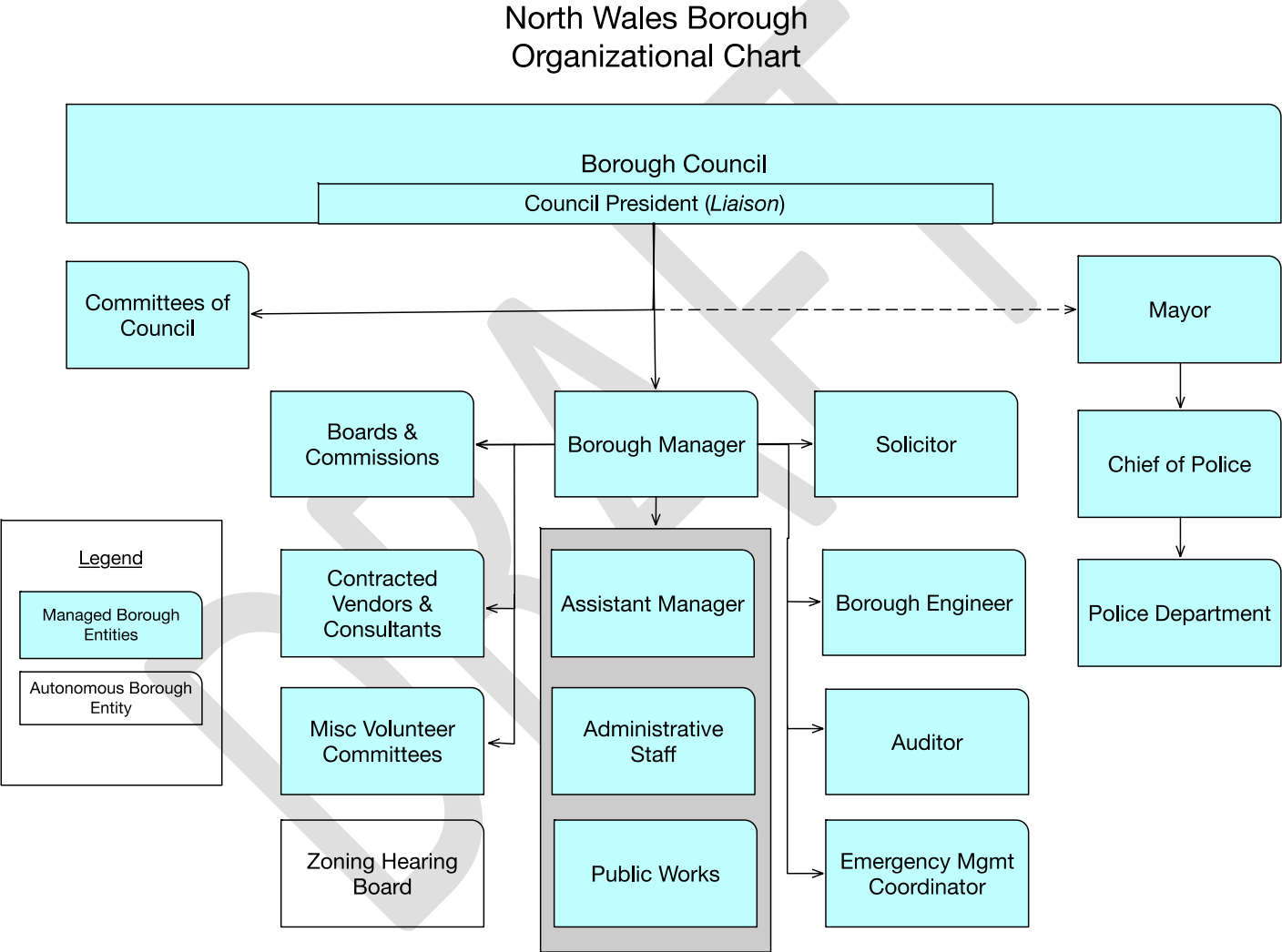

As a member of a board or commission, it is the responsibility of the council member to represent the views of the borough and to ensure the interests of borough residents are adequately addressed. Requests from a board or commission for a borough decision should be referred to Borough Management.

- ⁱ (PA Title 8: §1123.1.(a)) “General rule.--The mayor shall have full charge and control of the chief of police and the police force.”
- ⁱⁱ (North Wales Ordinance: § 45-9.B) “Except for the purpose of inquiry, the Borough Council, its committees and its members shall deal with the administrative service solely through the Manager, and neither the Borough Council nor any of its committees nor any of its members shall give orders, publicly or privately, to any subordinates of the Manager.”
- ⁱⁱⁱ (North Wales Ordinance: § 45-1.A) “The President of Council, in addition to the powers and duties vested in him by law, shall preside over meetings of Council *and have general and active management of the affairs of the Council.*”
- ^{iv} (PA Title 8: §1117.1.(a 3)) The borough solicitor shall: “Furnish the council or committees of the council, the mayor or the head of a department, upon request, with an opinion in writing upon any question of law which may be submitted by any of them in their official capacities.”
- ^v (North Wales Ordinance: § 45-9.C) “All complaints regarding services or personnel of the Borough shall be referred to the office of the Manager. The Manager shall investigate and resolve such complaints and shall report thereon to the Borough Council. He/she shall consult with Council in the resolution of all complaints which may result in litigation.”

President Amato led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Public Comment

There was none at this time.

Consideration: Adoption of Ordinance 821 – Stormwater Management Updates

Manager Hart introduced Scott Russell from the Borough's engineering firm, McMahon and Associates, who reviewed the comments and minor changes made to the advertised Ordinance being proposed. Mr. Russell elaborated on the benefits of adopting this model Ordinance and explained to Council many of the DEP's requirements.

Member McClure made a motion to approve Ordinance #821. Member Fazio seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Approval of 2023 Non-Uniform MMO

Manager Hart reviewed the 2023 Non-Uniformed MMO calculations along with a detailed memorandum explain the requirements and details relating the Borough's Pension obligation for active and retired members of the Borough Non-Uniformed Pension Plan.

Member McClure made a motion to approve the 2023 Non-Uniformed Minimum Municipal Obligation. Member Whelan seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Approval to Advertise Non-Uniformed Pension Amendment

Manager Hart reiterated and explained the amendments to the Non-Uniformed Pension Plan.

Member McClure made a motion to approve the amendments. Member Whelan seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Acceptance of Nor-Gwyn Pool Commissions Member Resignation

Manager Hart announced that included in the packet was a letter of resignation, effective immediately, from pool commission member Wendy McClure.

Member Fazio made a motion to accept the letter of resignation for the term expiring 12/31/2023 from the Nor-Gwyn Pool Commission. Member Whelan seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Approval of \$500 Sponsorship Donation to NPVFCO

The North Penn Volunteer Fire Company is seeking community partners and sponsors to host a community Chili Cook-Off on October 15, 2022, the Public Safety Committee along with the members of the fire company had spoke about this event earlier in the year and felt that it was only fitting for the Borough to help sponsor this event.

Member McClure made a motion to sponsor \$500. Member Collins seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Approval of Minutes: August 23, 2022

Member Neiderhiser made a motion to approve the minutes of August 23, 2022.

Member Fazio seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Discussion: 2023 Annual Budget Calendar

Manager Hart reviewed the upcoming 2023 Budget Calendar and tasks associated with same. She requested President Amato and members of the Finance Committee to discuss upcoming dates after the 30th of September to discuss potential projects and budgetary items for 2023. An itemized list of tasks and goal sates was reviewed and discussed.

Old Business / Committee & Board Reports / Zoning Applications

Manager Hart announced that the Borough's 2022 Fall-Winter newsletters were delivered to homes within the Borough and that many preparations have been underway for the upcoming

Community Day on September 24, 2022. She informed Council and the public, that there are currently no pending Zoning Applications, and the three applications heard on September 6, 2022, were approved.

Manager Hart highlighted the Board and Commissions reports included in the packet, HRC, Planning Commission, and Parks and Recreation updates were reviewed.

Solicitor / Mayor / Council / Chief / Public Works / Manager

Solicitor Filice announced that there will be an executive session after tonight's meeting regarding matters related to personnel, no action will be taken.

Mayor McDevitt welcomed Paddy Cakes bakery to the Borough and recommended tasting the Peanut Butter Indulgence cupcake, he indicated that it certainly lives up to its name! He had the pleasure of visiting a new business in town and said it was wonderful to talk with owner Krista who is a first-generation immigrant and opened the bake shop to fulfill a promise to her daughter who passed away a few years ago.

Mayor McDevitt also recognized the hardworking staff of the Borough - from the patrol officers and our new crossing guard to the admin staff and the public works crews. He said everyone is connected to the mission of making our Borough a wonderful place to live and visit. In addition, he mentioned looking forward to a training program he will be taking through PA State Association of Boroughs focusing on the roles and functions of the office of Mayor.

Lastly, the Mayor announced that today is the 10th anniversary of the death of Officer Brad Fox from Plymouth Township PD who was killed in the line of duty. "Please, in your own way, take a moment today to recognize the commitment our public servants, emergency responders, and peace officers bring to the jobs they do every day!"

Member Whelan recognized September 11th and the history surrounding the tragic day in our nation's history and asked everyone to reflect on the lives of those we lost and the families of those left behind. Member O'Neill thanked North Wales Baptist Church for ringing the bells to the song, "America, the Beautiful" in honor of the day. Mr. O'Neill said it was a very nice tribute and appreciated their efforts. Member McClure also made light of the sentiments surrounding 9-11, and reminded Council and residents that the Dawn Redwood Tree planted in Weingartner was planted as a 9-11 tribute.

Member Fazio thanked staff and the Borough Summer Intern, Ry Stratton, for the wonderful work done on the QR Code for the Communication Survey and was glad to see the newsletter arriving in homes and ready for Community Day. Member Neiderhiser and Member Tarlecki hoped everyone had a happy and safe Labor Day and agreed with the remarks of fellow Council members regarding September 11 and the importance of the memories and sacrifices made during that period in history.

President Amato specifically recognized the men and women who serve the Volunteer Medical Service Corps (VMSC), and said it is important not to take for granted the services relating to emergency responders, not only in fire services and police, but also in the medical field.

Chief Erenius reviewed results from last month's speed tracking records from several locations in the Borough, primarily S. Tenth Street, Walnut Street, S. Main Street, and Prospect Avenue. He informed Council that speed details would be assigned as necessary.

Public Works Supervisor Sleicher updated Council on work orders and task completed, inlets cleaning, inlet repairs and maintenance taking place, sealing of roads with crack master supplies, Community Day preparations and fall plantings were just a few of the items he touched upon.

Manager Hart made the following announcements: Community Day and NWPD Bike Rodeo on Saturday, September 24, Tuesday Morning Kid's Club, After-School Art Club, Chamber of Commerce events and the Boards and Commissions Vacancies.

Member Neiderhiser made a motion to adjourn. Member McClure seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no. Meeting adjourned at 8:01 P.M.

October 05, 2022 Meeting Minutes

The North Wales Borough Planning Commission Meeting of October 05, 2022 was conducted in person at North Wales Borough Hall.

The meeting information was advertised in The Reporter on December 21, 2021, as part of the meeting schedule for 2022.

The meeting was called to order by Chair Greta Martin Washington at 7:04 P.M. The following members were present: Greta Martin Washington, Mark Tarlecki, Lillian Higgins and Jocelyn Tenney. Member Greg D'Angelo was absent, having notified Alan Guzzardo he would be delayed. Member D'Angelo arrived at 8:00 P.M.

Assistant Borough Manager/Zoning Officer Alan Guzzardo was in attendance.

Tim Konetchy, Montgomery County Planning Commission Planner participated in the meeting.

Member Mark Tarlecki led the members in the Pledge of Allegiance.

1. Public Comment

There was no general public in attendance and no questions or comments were received from the public prior to the meeting.

2. Consideration: Approval of Minutes for September 07, 2022

Member Tarlecki made the motion to approve the minutes of September 07, 2022 and Member Higgins seconded the motion. All members voted to approve.

3. Discussion: Grant Application for 9th Street Park

Assistant Manager Guzzardo announced that North Wales Borough is applying for a PA State Grant for improvements in the 9th Street Park. This would include among other improvements a pervious path through the park, a planted meadow and signage indicating it is a park. The grant is for small municipalities with a 20% match. The grant recipients will be announced the first week in January 2023.

4. Discussion: INO Institutional Overlay District

The INO Institutional Overlay District was reviewed. Tim Konetchy presented updates following the September 07, 2022 discussion. The updates included establishment of an overlay district, permitted uses, dimensional standards and conditional use requirements.

5. Discussion: Sign Ordinance Update

Member Higgins asked about the time frame for the sign ordinance review. Tim Konetchy replied that it is on his agenda. Member Tenney noted the review would also include discussion and coordination with the North Wales Historical Architectural Review Board (HARB).

6. Discussion: Parking and Loading Regulations

Tim Konetchy presented suggested standards for parking areas, Subsection E, Driveways and vehicular access. These included design for a ribbon driveway and specifications for pervious paving. A turn-around area in the parking area would be required.

7. Discussion: Montgomery County 2021 Construction Reports and 2022 Inventory Reports.

Tim Konetchy presented inventory maps of Montgomery County that indicated the number of multi-family and attached housing locations as well as business park Inventory and age restricted housing inventory. Tim also provided a sampling of maps and data, some dating back to the 1960's, that is available on Montgomery County's website.

8. Discussion: Electric Car Charging Stations Research

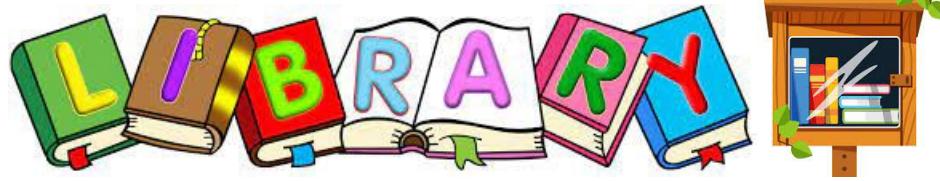
