Re: The 2020 Minimum Municipal Obligation (MMO) for the North Wales Borough Pension

Plan

Act 205 of 1984, as amended, governs the funding requirements for all municipal pension plans. The law requires the Chief Administrative Officer of each municipal pension plan to inform the governing board of the municipality of the Plan's expected financial obligation for the coming year. This must be done by the last business day in September.

The calculation of the 2020 Plan cost, or the MMO, required an estimate of the 2020 W-2 wages of the employees covered by the plan. I have indicated on the attached worksheet my best estimate of the same. Questions on the pension cost calculation may be addressed to either myself or the Pennsylvania Municipal Retirement System at 800-622-7968.

The MMO is the municipality's 2020 bill for this pension plan and must be paid by December 31, 2020. The obligation must be met with general fund monies or with any General State Aid to Municipal Pensions to which we may be entitled to under Act 205.

CALL TO ORDER made by President Sando.

Also in attendance were John Filice, Borough Solicitor and Michael Eves, Chief of Police. Alan Guzzardo, Assistant Borough Manager, was absent.

President Sando led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Public Comment

There was no public comment.

Discussion: Non-Discrimination Ordinance

President Sando stated that Solicitor Gifford has provided Council with Lansdale Borough's Human Relations Ordinance to use as an example for passing a similar ordinance in the Borough. President Sando then introduced Todd Snovel, the Director of the Pennsylvania Commission on LGBTQ Affairs. Mr. Snovel provided an overview of the issue and how North Wales Borough can take action by passing an ordinance to establish a Human Relations Committee to help resolve acts of discrimination within the Borough.

Member Scott stated the list of protected types of classes within Lansdale Borough's Ordinance is not comprehensive enough because it leaves out other types of classes such as political affiliation, physical characteristics, etc. Solicitor Filice stated Pennsylvania hasn't yet included sexual orientation or preference as a protected class. He then stated the Borough can pass an ordinance that includes these classes. Member Scott asked Solicitor Filice if the list of protected classes could be expanded to include political affiliation and any other classes that aren't protected. Solicitor Filice confirmed it can and Member Scott asked that other classes be included.

Member Amato noted that Council can modify and expand Lansdale Borough's Ordinance as they see fit for the Borough. He then expressed his support for moving forward with drafting an ordinance. Member O'Neill also expressed his support also for drafting an ordinance. Member O'Connell expressed his concerns with enforcement of such an ordinance, rather he proposed the

Borough pass a resolution condemning discriminatory actions. Solicitor Filice stated that a resolution wouldn't be enforceable, but an ordinance would be.

Andrew Berenson, 439 Washington Avenue, asked what enforcement action Lansdale Borough can take if someone were to commit a discriminatory act under their Ordinance. Solicitor Filice stated they have a Human Relations Commission to handle complaints related to discriminatory acts. Mr. Berenson asked if the commission would be comprised of local residents and what training is required for serving on the commission. He also expressed concerns with the legal liability aspect of enforcing an ordinance. Mr. Snovel stated Council would appoint residents to serve on the commission and the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission would provide ongoing training for commission members.

Member McClure expressed her support for moving forward with drafting an ordinance. She then thanked Mr. Snovel for being at the meeting to provide more information and answer questions. Vice President Cherry stated that discrimination is not an issue in the Borough. Therefore, he does not agree with passing an ordinance for an issue that he feels is not evident. Member Neiderhiser disagreed with Vice President Cherry and stated that discrimination does occur. Therefore, she said an ordinance is necessary. Member O'Connell stated North Wales Borough is a welcoming community and passing an ordinance would only cause more harm than good. Member Little also expressed his support for passing an ordinance. Member Scott requested that Council wait to discuss the details after an ordinance draft has been created. Member Amato asked Solicitor Filice to provide further clarification on enforcement. Solicitor Filice explained that if someone were to be found guilty of violating the ordinance, they would be subject to penalties under the Pennsylvania Human Relations Act.

Mike Allebach, owner of Allebach Photography, located at 405 E. Walnut Street, stated many of his clients are part of the LGBTQ community and they are discriminated against. He then expressed his support for passing an ordinance to protect these individuals. Sherwin Collins, 121 Shearer Street, stated that acts of discrimination are not always apparent. He then recounted incidents where he and his family have been discriminated against in the Borough. Kelly Welch, 113 S. Tenth Street, stated she and her partner do face discriminatory behavior everywhere, including the Borough. She then said it would mean a lot to her and other members of the LGBTQ community if North Wales Borough were to pass an ordinance.

Manager Hart expressed her concerns with labeling and classifying individuals. She then stated that passing an ordinance would not solve the root cause of the issue, but would lend an outlet and education to those who utilized the process.

Richard Buttacavoli, Lansdale Borough resident and former resident of North Wales Borough, stated one of the reasons he moved out of North Wales Borough is he was mistreated by a neighbor and he then said he feels protected in Lansdale Borough. He then stated that passing an ordinance would also help to support young individuals who are bullied for who they are.

Andrew Berenson, 439 Washington Avenue, asked if the intent of the ordinance is to only protect LGBTQ individuals. President Sando stated an ordinance would expand the list of protected classes. Mr. Berenson then asked if the Human Relations Commission would handle complaints related to all the protected classes. President Sando stated it would. He again expressed his concerns with training and the legal liability of a commission.

Solicitor Filice stated again that commission members will be subject to mandatory training and commission positions would be filled similar to a zoning hearing board.

Mayor D'Angelo stated he was sorry that Ms. Welch had been discriminated against in the Borough. He then said he hoped it was not a resident and cautioned people to not assume that people who are discriminating against others in the Borough are a part of the Borough.

Member O'Neill made a motion to authorize the Solicitor to draft a non-discrimination ordinance for Council's consideration. Member Little seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Appointment NWWA Board, Term Expiring 12/31/2020

Member Amato nominated Sally Neiderhiser to fulfil a vacancy on the North Wales Water Authority Board, term expiring 12/31/2020. Member McClure seconded the nomination.

Vice President Cherry then nominated Gregory D'Angelo to fulfill the vacancy. Member Amato seconded the nomination.

Council then took a roll call vote on appointing Sally Neiderhiser to fulfill the vacancy. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Council then took a roll call vote on appointing Gregory D'Angelo to fulfill the vacancy. Motion failed, 3 yes, 6 no. President Sando, Member McClure, Member Little, Member O'Neill, Member Neiderhiser and Member O'Connell voted no.

Consideration: Certificate of Appropriateness, 413 E. Montgomery Ave. & 112 School St.

Member McClure made a motion to approve a Certificate of Appropriateness as presented for 413 E. Montgomery Avenue. Member Little seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Member Little made a motion to approve a Certificate of Appropriateness as presented for 112 School Street. Member McClure seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Approval to Advertise Volunteer Fire Service Tax Credit Ordinance

Member Scott made a motion to approve advertisement of the Volunteer Fire Service Tax Credit Ordinance. Member McClure seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Disbursements: \$158,121.14

Manager Hart stated the disbursement amount is higher than usual because it includes a payment for the Safe Routes to School Program. She then reviewed the rest of the bills.

Also in attendance were Gregory Gifford, Borough Solicitor, Alan Guzzardo, Assistant Borough Manager and Michael Eves, Chief of Police.

President Sando led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Public Comment

Andrew Berenson, 439 Washington Avenue, requested that members of the public speak at the microphone when commenting on the Human Relations Ordinance instead of from their chairs.

Discussion: Human Relations "Draft" Ordinance

Solicitor Gifford provided an overview of the draft ordinance. Council members made a number of suggested changes to the draft ordinance. Vice President Cherry asked how the proposed Human Relations Commission would be funded. President Sando stated it would be funded as part of the annual budget. Vice President Cherry then asked how complaints would be handled. Manager Hart stated complaints would be received by the Borough Administration. The Administration would then forward the complaints to the Commission.

Members of Council voiced their concerns with regard to the proposed ordinance. Member Scott noted that the list of protected classes does not include political affiliation. Member O'Neill opposed adding political affiliation as a protected class. Vice President Cherry asked if any discrimination cases have been filed since similar ordinances have been passed in other municipalities. Solicitor Gifford stated there are none that he knows of yet.

Mayor D'Angelo then voiced his concerns with the proposed ordinance. He suggested it would be better for Council to do a resolution in support of statewide anti-discrimination legislation. However, he recommended a number of revisions to the ordinance if Council chose to move forward with passing an ordinance. Member Neiderhiser voiced her support for passing the ordinance

Andrew Berenson, 439 Washington Avenue, stated he agreed with Mayor D'Angelo. He then disagreed with Member O'Neill's position on including political affiliation as a protected class. He voiced concerns with the transparency of commission meetings. Solicitor Gifford stated the meetings would be private. However, there will be records of the meetings that can be requested if need be. Mr. Berenson then asked what the consequences are if a Commission member failed to complete the required training. He then suggested that members who fail to complete training should not be allowed to hear a case. Solicitor Gifford stated the ordinance says that Commission members "shall" have training. This meant that members could be removed if they failed to complete the required training. Mr. Berenson then asked who determines whether a case will be heard. President Sando stated the Commission will determine that. He then suggested it needs to be made apparent that both parties are responsible for the costs of the proceedings. He then asked for confirmation that possible re-advertisement of the ordinance would be required, should the ordinance be amended. Solicitor Gifford stated that is correct.

Patricia Armstrong, 517 E. Prospect Avenue, asked about the definition of discrimination. She suggested the word discrimination be taken out. She suggested under sexual orientation, that it include other categories such as asexuality, transgender, etc. She then suggested that the required training be very more specific as to who will be providing the training, how many training hours are necessary and what the costs are. President Sando stated the training would be provided by the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission. She then suggested that a "good faith" provision be put into the ordinance.

Austin Armstrong, 517 E. Prospect Avenue, stated he is proud of the community for moving forward with the ordinance.

Council members deliberated on adding political affiliation as one of the protected classes. Andrew Berenson, 439 Washington Avenue, stated he supported Member Scott and requested a roll call vote. Mayor D'Angelo stated political discrimination is a real threat and urged Council to add it as a protected class even though it is not a protected class under current State law.

Member Scott made a motion to add political affiliation as a protected class. Member O'Connell seconded the motion. Motion passed 6 yes, 3 no. Member Little, Member O'Neill and Member Neiderhiser voted no.

Council continued to review the other proposed changes to the Ordinance.

Richard Buttacavoli, Lansdale Borough resident and former resident of North Wales Borough, suggested intersex be added as a protected class.

Kelly Welch, 113 S. Tenth Street, suggested that every protected class have equal representation on the Commission. She then urged Council to approve a proclamation condemning discrimination if it is going to take a while for Council to adopt the ordinance.

Andrew Berenson, 439 Washington Avenue, thanked President Sando for facilitating the process.

Vice President Cherry expressed concerns with the limitations of committee members.

Member Neiderhiser suggested hearing impaired/hard of hearing be added as a protected class.

Council broke for a quick recess.

Discussion: Streetlight Procurement Program Specifications & Proposal

Manager Hart provided an overview of the program's construction specifications and proposal. She then stated that construction would likely start in October/November and it should take about a week or so to complete.

Member O'Neill expressed his concerns with light pollution. Public Works Supervisor Coccio explained the new LED lights will be comparable to the existing lights and the proper light head will be used for each light to help decrease light pollution.

Consideration: Certification Renewal: Certified Local Government (CLG) Program

Manager Hart provided an overview of the program and the benefits of renewing the certification.

Member McClure made a motion to approve a certification renewal agreement for the Certified Local Government Program. Member Scott seconded the motion. Motion passed 9 yes, 0 no.

Presentation: 2018 Municipal Annual Audit & Financial Report

Member Amato asked for clarification on the assets valuations. Mr. Rapp stated an evaluator assigns a value for each fixed asset. Mr. Amato then asked how salaries are tested. Mr. Rapp stated it is done by comparing information from prior W-2s and average salaries for each position. Manager Hart stated they also review meeting minutes to confirm Council's approval of budgetary items and allocated expenses.

Anthony Rapp, Mallie, LLP provided a summary of the Borough's 2018 Municipal Annual Audit and Financial Report.

Consideration: Acceptance of Donation from Tex-Mex Connection

Member McClure made a motion to accept a donation in the amount of \$2,500.00 from Tex-Mex Connection, to be earmarked for the D.A.R.E. program. Member Little seconded the motion. Motion passed, 7 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Approval of Streetlight Purchasing & Participation Agreement

Michael Fuller, Keystone Lighting Solutions, provided an overview of the streetlight purchasing and participation agreement.

Member Amato asked Mr. Fuller if the request for construction proposals is done collectively for all the participating municipalities. Mr. Fuller confirmed it is.

Manager Hart provided clarification on where the "area" lighting fixtures are located and gave an example of parking lot lights, exterior building lights, etc. Mr. Fuller then reviewed the lighting control options and color temperature options.

Member Amato asked what the cost would be for changing the color temperature for a fixture. Mr. Fuller stated you wouldn't be able to quickly change the color temperature. Mr. Amato then asked for more information on the cost savings with the network control option. Mr. Fuller stated most municipalities don't invest in it because it's more expensive, but it can have good cost savings potential for larger municipalities.

Manager Hart stated the original total estimated cost for the program was around \$90,000.00 for upgrading the Cobra Head and "area" lighting fixtures with the manual control option and it would be an extra \$30,000.00 to upgrade the decorative lighting fixtures. She said it is not practical at the moment to upgrade the decorative fixtures because the Borough is looking into completing an entire streetscape redesign project on Main and Walnut Streets and there may be serious issues with the existing fixtures. However, she said it would be good to still include them in the project study to confirm if there are any major issues with the existing features.

Member McClure asked why is there a need to have the manual controls. Manager Hart stated the Borough should invest in the manual controls because it would allow the Borough to adjust the brightness of the lighting fixtures as needed and it's very affordable.

Vice President Cherry asked what the wattage is of the 15 existing LED fixtures in the Borough. Mr. Fuller stated some of the existing LED fixtures are 51 watts. Mr. Fuller stated 38 watt fixtures would be installed in the residential areas and 106 watt fixtures would be installed in the commercial areas where there is a lot of activity.

Member Amato asked for clarification on the total project costs with the rebates. Mr. Fuller stated the cost savings with the rebates is shown in the project cash flow.

Member O'Connell asked what would be needed to include the decorative fixtures if they choose to upgrade them. Manager Hart stated Council would need to approve a change order, which can be done during construction if Council chooses to do so.

Member Neiderhiser made a motion to approve the Streetlight Purchasing and Participation Agreement. Member McClure seconded the motion. Motion passed, 7 yes, 0 no.

Consideration: Final Escrow Release: 715 E. Montgomery Avenue




